The New James Lee Center

As of June 16, the entire Cultural Resource staff is now located at the James Lee Center at 2855 Annandale Road. The James Lee Center was totally renovated and provides us with beautiful, state-of-theart facilities. As part of the move, they were provided with new furniture, compactor storage in the lab, and a bright new setting. They are slowly unpacking all of our many belongings and settling in. The challenge is to get two operations-worth of books, artifacts and equipment into their space and to use the space most efficiently. But, as a result of the consolidation, they have an exceptionally well-equipped facility. They continue to discover and marvel at the wealth of resources that we have collectively. As with any move, there have been a few hiccups, mainly with getting the phone system and email up and running. But, they have been making forward momentum and look forward to welcoming members of the Chapter to our new "home".

They wish to thank all of the Chapter members who assisted in the packing of the Ellmore Farm facility. Without their assistance, the move would have been far more chaotic.

LBA (44FX2723) - Berno Tops and his crew have completely exposed a new "platform hearth" in the vicinity of where we recovered a spurred "thumbnail" endscraper made of quartz (Block I). As of now, they were opening squares around another concentration of FCR. Due to the varieties of tools around each, these concentrations suggest residential locations.

The cicada invasion helped to explain why they have found no positive postmolds or pit features (the previously reported pit may have been caused by a tree fall). Imagine every 17 years for thousands of years, having up to a million cicada grubs per acre emerge through the upper soil layers from their feeding grounds (sic), 2-8 feet below the surface. The soil becomes like swiss cheese each time.

The newest finds from Block I include a Middle Archaic Morrow Mountain point and a Late Archaic soapstone bowl fragment, in addition to the endscraper, which should date from the Paleoindian or possibly Early Archaic period. No other, positively

identified, early artifacts have yet to be recovered from the block

The Park Authority has requested a Threatened Sites grant from the Virginia Department of Historic Resources to fund the analysis and report writing on the site. The money will be used to fund Berno for that purpose. The intention is to work as long as possible at the site until September 1 or construction starts, whichever comes first.

Space Still Available in the Alexandria Archaeology Summer Camp!

A few slots remain in the Alexandria Archaeology Summer Camp 2004. The day camp is designed for 12-15 year olds. Campers will excavated the Shuter's Hill site in Alexandria, process their artifacts in the laboratory, visit a historic site and have an ice cream break in Old Town! Camp runs from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday. Session I runs from July 19 - 23 and Session II from July 26- 30. The cost is \$300/session.


GIS Database for Fairfax County

The week of May 17-24 marked a significant development in the recording of archaeological sites in the state of Virginia. The Department of Historic Resources was able to receive and use the archaeology Geographic Information System database used in Fairfax County. All of the sites recorded in Fairfax County are on the database, which was developed and is maintained by FCPA archaeology volunteer C.K. Gailey.

Keith Egloff, archaeologist at VDHR, said the advantages of using Fairfax County data include not having to duplicate the plotting of sites, eliminating the possibility of site data which differs in VDHR and Fairfax County, and having access to added information on each site. Egloff added that Fairfax County is the <u>first</u> jurisdiction in the state to provide a county-wide site database electronically.
