Prince William County is providing dumpsters to allow volunteers to clean up the trash, brush (not much), and dead wood (lots) from the Alabama Cemetery next to the battlefield. Over 60 depressions have been mapped and the Sons of the Confederate Veterans have asked, including our chapter, for help cleaning the site. Chapter members were instrumental in providing an independent archaeological survey of the cemetery in 2003. The photograph is of a mechanical screen used at Fort Union, North Dakota by the National Park Service. It was basically a modified grain cleaner, with 1/4 inch mesh on the sides, tiled up so the dirt would sift out and the artifacts and gravels come out into a bucket or wheel barrow on the far end. It worked great in the sandy and gravelly soils, but not so good in clays or hard silts. Artifact recovery was also good, and the artifacts did not appear to be that damaged from the process.
