
APPLY FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Maryland Workshop in Archeology - In spite of the wonderful weather predicted for this weekend, sadly we will not be in the field at Cardinal Glen on Saturday. I will be giving a talk on Cactus Hill and the Search for Pre-Clovis this Saturday, March 7, at 18th Annual Maryland Workshop in the Archeology. The talk will be followed by an amiable panel discussion between Stuart Fiedel, Joe Dent and me on the issues surrounding Pre-Clovis in the Americas. By the make-up of the panel it is assumed that Joe Dent will be the referee. The panel will also entertain questions from the audience.

Other topics include <u>Clay Tobacco Pipe</u> <u>Manufacture</u> (Paul Jung), a two part <u>Prehistoric</u> <u>Overview</u> (Charlie Hall), <u>Searching for the Lion of</u> <u>Baltimore</u> (David Shaw and Steve Anthony), <u>An</u> <u>Introduction to Post-Colonial Earthenwares</u> (Patricia Samford), <u>Small finds, Big Concepts</u> (Sara rivers-Cofield), <u>The Woodland Bow</u> (Roy Brown), and <u>Volunteering in Underwater Archeology</u> (Dave Howe). <u>Cardinal Glen (44FX3379)</u> - During our last session, we completed two, two-inch levels below the A soil (level 1) in the southern end of the trench. We continued to notice artifacts through both levels, including a notched point fragment (possibly Early Woodland) in level 2 and what appeared to be a post mold at the bottom of level 3.

In re-evaluating the construction plans it appears that more of the site area next to the cut bank will be removed as part of the stream stabilization associated with the storm water management pond reconstruction. As a result of this and the high potential for good data from the projected impact area we plan to expand data recovery on the more extensive threatened areas of the site.

We set up a 10x10-foot block and laid out the A soil horizon grid for "swizzle stick archeology." It will be removed in two-foot contiguous shovel test pits down to the bottom of the A soil. We will then re-grid the floor of the block into four 5x5-foot excavation squares and trowel excavate them. This will be an opportunity for certification candidates and interested volunteers to get experience in tightly controlled excavation methods - we will be plotting artifacts, mapping features (hopefully) and recovering charcoal.

However, with the Saturday Workshop (above), the Middle Atlantic Archeological Conference (March 20-22), and monitoring the clean-up of the McCue property at Colchester (March 28), we may be hard pressed to get much done until April. The plan was to work the site mostly on Friday's and Saturdays but that has to change. This is a higher a priority. We will be out there more than planned during the week, this month.

<u>Schedule</u>: Weather permitting, we plan to be at Cardinal Glen on Saturday (3/14). If the weather looks good you will be notified of other field days a few days before we go out.


Lab - Generally, unless otherwise announced, we will continue to have regular lab on Tuesday's. We are now re-processing the artifacts from the Neha Site (44FX1561), excavated by Larry Moore in the late 1980s. That is the site where Dave Rubis recovered the attached Paleoamerican point, which is the most impressive point yet recovered from Fairfax County.



Quartzite projectile point from Cardinal Glen





EMBASSY OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA

Members of the Northern Virginia Chapter of the ASV went to the Korus House of the Embassy of the Republic of Korea in Washington D.C. on February 10, 2009 to listen to a presentation on Korean archaeology by Dr. Choi Sung-rak. Dr. Sung-rak is a professor of archaeology at the Mokpo National University in Cheonggye-myeon, Muan county, Jeollanam-do. Dr. Sung-rak is also the President of the Honam Archaeological Society. The late Colonel Howard MacCord of Virginia did some of his earliest international archaeology in Korea in the 1950s. His research is still used and referred to as some of the earliest archaeology in Korea. His widow, Betsy MacCord, came to the presentation in his memory, as well as Harry and Shirley Jaeger, and Diane and Patrick O'Neill.
