# FAIRFAXCOUNTYARCHAEOLOGYSCHEDULEMike Johnson

**Fairfax County History Conference (Sat. 11/7/09)** - The annual conference will be held at the James Lee Center this year. The County Archeology Program is one of the main attractions so we will be in the lab rather than in the field at Cardinal Glen. Since we will be hosting lab tours, volunteers are welcome in the lab on Saturday.

**Cardinal Glen (44FX3379)** - Due to the History Conference we will not be in the field on Saturday (11/7). We will try to finish up the excavation on Saturday (11/14). The schedule is to meet at the end of Rockwell Court at 9 am.

**Gault Field Trip** - The crew had a great time and helped the Gault staff get closer to their goal of opening up a large Paleoamerican surface at the bottom of their block. Much of our help was focused on getting through the thick Archaic cultural levels on top of the Paleo levels.

The block is approximately 6 meters (18-20 feet) square. Our crew and friends provided approx. 160 person days at about 8 hours each for almost 1300 hours. Considering the quality of the crew one would estimate the value of the time contributed to be about \$20,000. If it were a consulting firm that would equate to more than \$50,000. Crew pictures also are attached.

The crew completed numerous 10 centimeter levels in very hard, clayey soil. The soil difficulties were compounded by the large quantities of burned limestone and thousands of artifacts. some pictures of which are attached. When we arrived they had no features visible in the block. When we left they had 3 positive FCR lined features and two possible other FCR lined features. A picture of the first feature, which was discovered by Jackie Cuyler and Karen Schweikart, is

attached. Other pictures will follow as we get copies of pictures taken by the crew.

The Virginia crew was invited back. They did an outstanding job that is a great credit to Fairfax County Archeology and the ASV's Avocational Archeologist Certification Program.
