CLARK'S BRANCH BRIDGE

These photos, which were taken on December 17, 2009, are of Robin Rentsch of the Great Falls Trailblazers and her horse, Rennie, who were the first equestrians to cross the new bridge over Clarks Branch in Riverbend Park. Robin's husband, Sam, lays claim to being the first cyclist.



This bridge completes the section of the Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail (PHNST) between Great Falls National Park and Algonkian Regional Park. The Park Authority is planning a formal ribbon cutting ceremony later in the spring, but I did not want to wait that long to acknowledge the quite astounding number of people who contributed their time and skill to the successful completion of this project.

Park Authority staff, volunteers, and consultants have been working towards this goal for over three years. Many others from outside organizations also made very significant contributions along the way. I would like to sincerely thank the many contributors who include:

Don Briggs, the Superintendent of the PHNST with the National Park Service, who provided the impetus for the whole process by entering into a cooperative agreement with the Park Authority to fund the initial hydrology and feasibility study. Later on he followed up with another agreement to fund the Phase II and III archaeology.

Robin Rentsch, Eleanor Weck and other members of the Great Falls Trailblazers who helped create the political will to fund the bridge design and construction and gave advice along the way on how to make the bridge horse-friendly.

Stephen Potter, National Park Service, and Ethel Eaton, Virginia Department of Historic Resources, who, along with Liz Crowell of the FCPA and Don Briggs, sprang into action to expedite the Memorandum of Agreement allowing the Phase III archaeology to commence at a critical point in the project schedule.
