CELEBRATE FAIRFAX!

Celebrate Fairfax! is a great opportunity for ASV/Northern VA Chapter members to promote archaeology in the county. The County Board of Supervisors created õCelebrate Fairfax!ö in 1984 to celebrate the County of Fairfax and its various communities.

The event traces its history back to colonial times when the Virginia House of Burgesses mandated that an annual Fair be held to promote commerce, economic development and a sense of community.

The Northern Virginia Chapter of the Archaeological Society of Virginia will be hosting an exhibit booth at õCelebrate Fairfax!ö and all ASV Chapter Members are invited to volunteer to staff the booth.

According to its promoters, Celebrate Fairfax! Northern Virginia® largest community-wide celebration, will run June 7-9, 2013 at the Fairfax County Government Center. Presented by Celebrate Fairfax, Inc., the annual festival hosts tens of thousands of visitors during the three-day run.

The 25-acre site is magically filled with fascinating sights and sounds of more than 300 exhibitors, food vendors, crafters and interactive activities. Celebrate Fairfax! Old Colchester Park and Preserve

Kayla M. has been working hard to expose and excavate a large burned soil deposit near the Roydson Driveway at OCPP. This feature has interesting artifacts dating to the mid-eighteenth century, ranging from Whieldon clouded ware ceramics, to a large number of white clay 5/64ö bore smoking pipes. There were also many oyster shell and metal fragments discovered during excavation. All of the feature soil was saved for water screen processing through window mesh and ½ screens, so smaller artifacts should be recovered after it is processed in the lab.

Jonathan B. discovered a large post-hole beneath a buried cultural horizon containing colonial artifacts indicating it could be related to the õold buildingö marked on a 1950s map. Already the artifacts from Colchester are arriving at the lab in buckets for washing and processing. Not only are they plentiful, but they are incredibly interesting from the small to the large. Once the window mesh material comes to the lab it will be time to screen it into ¼ö and into pickings. The work in the lab is about to get varied, even more exciting, and we can always use help.

We continue to work hard on forming an adequate access database. No system is perfect and within the archaeological community it seems little find complete satisfaction with their cataloging systems. A lot of trial and error has led us down a continually improving path. Microsoft Access will allow us the ability to do analysis and queries in extremely helpful ways. Marion has continued to be an invaluable addition to our staff. She has cleaned up our mapping within GIS, prepared different kinds of projects on the park, and ultimately provided us with some great analysis.

AutoCAD has also become a great addition to our software allowing us to do accurate vector drawings that we so desperately needed. It is not only necessary for our architectural historian, but AutoCAD works well with the GIS programs, and will allow us to do the measured drawings of plan views and profiles. The possibilities these programs

provide is endless and it will be exciting to see what else we can produce in order to accurately assess and portray Old Colchester Park and Preserve.

Come join CART for our open house on June 1st, 2013 from 10 am until 2 pm. Several units will be open to view and CART staff members will be available to answer any questions. Charles Smith, FCPA naturalist, will also be providing a tour of plant and animal life throughout Old Colchester Park and Preserve. Let&s hope for a beautiful spring day!
