

Mike Johnson, Diane Schug-O@Neill, and Jackie Cuyler provided me with an extensive list of excavations the Chapter participated in within Fairfax County, Virginia and other continental US Locations. Within Fairfax County archaeology alone, the Chapter has contributed in excess of 80.000 hours!

One final note, there is no May chapter meeting. We are scheduled for an interesting and informative tour of The Falls Church (yes, the Church came before the named city) on Saturday, May 13<sup>th</sup> at 1 PM. Chapter members and family, members of the community and ASV members are invited. Evidently, George Washington had a significant role in the Churchés transition from its original wood to its current brick structure. We look forward to this wonderful opportunity!

## **CART**County Archaeological Research Team

Excavation has begun into the features at the current project area on the western side of the county. Feature 5, which Chris S. is digging in the image, is about a meter (3 feet) in depth from the top with cut subsoil at the bottom and along the walls. Filled with large stone, artifacts and charred wood flecking, this is probably the cellar for a domestic structure.

From this feature, volunteers and staff have recovered many late-eighteenth and early-nineteenth century artifacts ranging from pearlware ceramics to wrought nails and large metal artifacts. Other features currently in excavation have yielded larger stone, and charred wood. Though not as deep, these other features could represent outbuildings such as a smokehouse, detached kitchen, or shed.



With the feature excavation, the soils are saved for waterscreen windowscreen samples. With the warmer spring days, the waterscreen process has also begun, and the samples are now dry and await the patience and great eye sight of our volunteers in the lab.

Picking through the waterscreen windowscreen samples usually yields seeds, straight pins, beads, and small animal bone. These animal bones inform the archaeologist of local fish in the river or livestock which were consumed by the inhabitants. Come join us in the lab to see what the samples hold.

Chris and Kayla attended an X-Ray Fluorescence (XRF) lecture and workshop in April to learn how to use an XRF machine. The technology is quite amazing! It is able to measure the elements present in a sample, which can be useful for archaeologists and museum professionals alike.

Knowing what elements are present in an artifact can help determine which preservation methods to use, know if an artifact could be potentially hazardous and specially stored, and help to source an artifact. Kayla brought a few samples of colonoware to the workshop and found they are

comprised of iron, nickel, manganese, calcium, copper, zinc, and several other elements.

Kayla and Elizabeth will be attending a workshop for archaeologists at the Maryland Archaeological Conservation Lab. The workshop will cover some artifact identification, collections management strategies and field conservation.
