


FROM THE CHAPTER PRESIDENT PATRICK O'NEILL



<u>Wm. Jack Hranicky</u> <u>1941-2020</u>

Jack Hranicky was a retired U.S. Government contractor, and was involved with archaeology as a full-time passion for over 40 years. His main interest was the Paleo-Indian period; however, he worked in all facets of American archaeology. He published over 200 papers and over 40 books in archaeology with one being a two-volume, 800 page, 10,000 artifacts book on the material culture of Virginia.



He was a charter member of the Registry of Professional Archaeologists RPA. And, since he joined the Archeological Society of Virginia (ASV) in 1966, he was one its senior members.

He taught anthropology at the Northern Virginia Community College and St Johns High School College. This course was the first high school course in anthropology in the U.S. He delivered 100s of archaeological papers at various amateur and professional conferences throughout the U.S. He published the first popular publication in archaeology ó called Popular Archaeology.

In the 1980s, he served on the Society for American Archaeologyøs Crabtree Award for the outstanding avocational archaeologist. In 2011, he was selected to serve again on this committee. He wrote an early Amateur certification program which various forms of it are found in many state archaeological societies.

He served as president of the Archeological Society of Virginia (ASV) and Eastern States Archeological Federation (ESAF), and past chairman of the Alexandria Archaeology Commission. He was director of the Virginia Rockart Survey and (formerly) the McCary Fluted Point Survey. And, he was former president of the Alexandria Radio Club. He is a past president of the ASV¢s Northern Virginia Chapter.

He operated the first electronic bulletin broad for archaeology and the Internet first website in archaeology. He held the Internet domain archeology.org. He started the webpages for the ASV and ESAF. He had five websites, notably www.va-rockart.org and www.bipoints.com.

He medicated the turnover of the Marylandøs Sandy Hill Adena Cache to the public domain. This collection is considered a national treasure. He assisted in the turnover of numerous private artifacts to public agencies and museums. Also, he has performed nearly 200 artifact collection appraisals of which they were from Missouri to Florida to New York. He analyzed over two million artifacts, and participated in nearly 50 excavations. He had been the principal investigator for 6 excavations, such as the Tanner soapstone site in Brunswick County.

He did his undergraduate at the Virginia Commonwealth University and graduate studies at the University of Oklahoma.

He received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Authentic Artifact Collectors Association (AACA) in 2010. Also, as a government contractor, he received the Meritorious Achievement for Excellence Award from the U.S. Department of State.

Fairfax County Archaeological Research Team

Fairfax County remains in Phase Three of the Covid-19 reopening plan throughout August. CART Archaeologists continued work in Old Colchester Park and Preserve (OCPP) in the first half of the month and were able to complete their current project in a historic artifact concentration deep within the park. Usually, when a project is completed, the artifacts will be brought to the lab to be washed and cataloged by our wonderful lab staff and a team of dedicated volunteers. Unfortunately, our lab remains closed for the foreseeable future due to the safety concerns surrounding Covid-19.

Our Lab Director and Assistant Lab Director have done an incredible amount of work creating new cataloging guides and manuals for the lab. Our Lab director Elizabeth as recently completed cataloging the artifacts collected last summer from Mount Air, the field crew will be revisiting this park very soon.

The survey conducted in Mount Air yielded a number of historic artifacts throughout the park and a few concentrations of prehistoric artifacts. The field crew will be returning to this artifact concentration to further investigate the Native American component of the park. The ACB staff continues to work hard on a variety of tasks outside of the field including report writing, research, deed transcription, working in the database, and preparing for future projects.
