NVC continues to meet via Zoom every second Wednesday of the month. Mike Johnson and Patrick O'Neill are both reviving old projects and starting new ones.

Ball Seller House in Arlington

On March 5, Phase 1 STPs were dug at the 1742 Ball-Sellers House. Patrick O'Neill is being assisted by ASV Certification students as well as Northern Virginia Chapter members and members of the Arlington Historical Society. Patrick O'Neill plans to continue Phase 1 STPs at the Ball Seller House in Arlington on Saturdays, March 19 and 26. This is the oldest home in Arlington County; built in 1742 and added onto in several episodes. The home is a remarkable example of the original 1742-era clapboard shingles and still sports original chinking amongst the logs. The 20' Survey Grid was set up the weekend before by Patrick O'Neill, Diane Schug-O'Neill, and Kurt Fredrickson.

Jasper Ridge

Mike Johnson has a project at Jasper Ridge, south of Front Royal, Va.

Mike noted: Earlier this week the area within the shovel test pit (STP) grid was cleared of underbrush, logs and small trees. On March 7 the grid was setup. The site is not expected to be stratified because the only kind of soil build-up expected would be from wind-blown (aeolian) deposits ("celestial dust"). The site is on top of a hill. However, the process of bio-turbation has been proven to cause artifacts to gradually drift down over time. with the potential for 13,000 years of that process impacting surface artifacts we could identify some evidence. The other caution on all such sites is that despite the fact a site might have been plowed, intrusive pit features and hearths have been recovered below upland deflated contexts. We want to have some idea about the natural soil so we can excavate our STPs by natural soil strata.

On Saturday, March 12, starting at 8 a.m., and weather permitting, the STPs will begin. Be prepared for ticks when the weather gets warm. Bring lunch, water, and bug repellant. The site will be open to the sun until the leaves come out.

• January 12th: Patrick O'Neill discussed the Archaeology of the Dependencies at Arlington House, where he dug a well unit that is still in place, covered by plywood. Constructed from 1802-1818, the Greek revival-style mansion was built to be both the residence of George Washington Parke Custis and as the nation's first memorial to his adoptive grandfather, George Washington.

• February 9th: Zachary L. Singer, Ph,D., research archaeologist for the Maryland Historical Trust, discussed Templeton: A Deeply Buried 12,000 Year Old Site in Western Connecticut. As a student at University of Connecticut, he analyzed the 1970s work of Dr. Roger Moeller on the site, which dates to 12,000 years ago. Singer noted a large quantity of fluted point production debris.

CART

Fairfax County Archaeological Research Team

This month CART's Field and lab crews have been very busy this month organizing and completing older projects in order to prepare lab space for upcoming excavations and the eventual return of volunteers. Reorganizing the library has been a huge undertaking and is still very much a work in progress, but it has never looked cleaner and so organized! Lab organization has also included the cataloging of artifacts, the completion of project reports, and the transfer of quite a few projects to Collections.

The Fairfax Artifacts page has updated again! This month our senior field technician Brittany wrote a piece for the Fairfax County ArtiFACTS blog on the complex history of colonoware and its link to the enslaved individuals. Colonoware might not be a term that everyone is familiar with. Typically, it describes a type of undecorated ceramic made with locally sourced clay fired at a low temperature dating from the 17th to 19th centuries. Colonoware vessels, like those pictured from the Lyndam Hill site in Fairfax County, have been

archaeologically recovered from enslaved contexts within plantation sites across the southeastern united states. The full article can be found on the Fairfax County ArtiFACTS page,
